





A paradox is a contradiction that at first glance appears to make sense, but which, upon further reflection, is seen as illogical. Commonly known as "doublespeak," equivocation is the use of vague language to hide one's meaning or to avoid committing to a point of view. Irony is a literary device that relies on the difference between expectation and outcome. An oxymoron is a figure of speech where two words of opposite meaning are used together.
